

The Parish Council

There will be no Parish Council Election on 4 May, as we are one short on nominations and so consequently all seven candidates will be elected. All are current Parish Councillors. The absentee is Bert Bason MBE, who has decided to retire.

On behalf of the village I would like to thank Bert for his service over a number of years. He has been an invaluable source of advice and counsel on a wide range of subjects and his input will be missed. Doubtless, we will be able to call upon his advice on an extra-statutory basis as and when required, but in the meantime his desire to cut back a little on his voluntary commitments is quite understandable.

The vacancy means that one of the first jobs of the new Parish Council will be to consider likely names for cooption to the Council. If you would like to put your name forward for consideration or if you want to know what the job entails, do please feel free to contact me or any of the serving councillors. All enquiries will, of course, be treated in the strictest confidence.

Although there is no Parish Council Election on 4 May, there is the Unitary Council Election, and, as usual, voting for Clungunford Parish will take place in the village hall.

The Annual Parish Meeting takes place on 10 May at 8 pm, following the first meeting of the new Parish Council, when the year will be reviewed, and you will have the opportunity to raise any matters of concern.

There is still no news on the Hopton Heath poultry units planning application, although I suspect the decision is quite close. The Planning Inspector has asked for comments on the extension of the existing units, the extant planning permission for which no one knew about whilst the Shropshire application was being fought out. Your Parish Council has already commented on this in the strongest possible terms, and Shropshire Council has effectively admitted that it did not take this into account.

The next Parish Council meeting is due to take place at 7 pm on Wednesday 10 May in the Parish Hall. Everyone is welcome to attend. In The Garden

A sunny day in Clungunford and I've just been watching bees working some of the flowers in my garden and hoping at least some of the insects working so industriously were mine. There are so many hives in the vicinity that I know of, I couldn't be sure.

A few weeks ago it was the red flowers of the Japanese Quince, *Chaenomeles speciosa 'Falconnet Charlet'*, they were enjoying. This time it was the yellow blossoms of *Caltha palustris*, the Marsh Marigold, or Kingcup, which flourishes in the centre of my pond as well as the marshy edges of it, and is spreading with an abandon I might regret in time.

In a few weeks' time it will the multitude of blue flowers covering the Californian Lilac, *Ceanothus thrysiflorus*, a shrub which prefers warmer conditions really, but clings to life in my garden despite a climate which doesn't really suit it much of the time, which will seem to be humming themselves with so many bees visiting them for their pollen. Proof that, in my garden at least, despite what some experts say, the bees have no preference where colour is concerned.

In the garden, keeping up the bee friendly flowers theme, any time between May and September, look out for the slightly cupped, sweetly scented, white and yellow carpet of flowers which, *Limnanthes douglasii*, the Poached Egg plant, an annual, will produce.

Sometimes called the "Bee Flower", because honey bees are said to be so attracted to it for both its nectar and pollen, when I grew it in my own garden a year or two ago, it was notable for its complete lack of attendant bees of any sort. Nor has it grown again as a result of self-seeding, as it's supposed to do. Perhaps because it didn't attract enough insects to pollinate its flowers. Though that could be a virtue rather than fault. It depends on your point of view. *Brian Taylor*

Postcard from Africa

Last month, the Disasters Emergency Committee, a consortium of the major British international development organisations, launched an appeal for donations to support relief assistance targeting around 10 million people living in countries affected by famine. They stretch from Nigeria in the west, through South Sudan and Somalia to the Yemen. By far the largest number – around 7million – are in South Sudan. What is different on this occasion is that there have been no major natural disasters, all of the food shortages are solely due to human activity.

In Nigeria, thousands of people have been displaced from their home areas by the actions of Boko Haram, the fundamentalist Islamic group which was responsible for the abduction of more than 200 schoolgirls from the village of Kibok three years ago. Nothing has been heard of most of these girls since. Despite Nigeria having the second largest economy in Africa, it has been impossible for the army to protect all of the civilians and thousands of people have been forced off their

farms and out of their homes, thus losing their livelihoods and becoming dependent on relief aid.

We have seen horrendous reports on the TV of child malnutrition and other suffering in the Yemen, where a bitter civil war has raged for more than two years. Powerful neighbours in the region, namely Iran and Saudia Arabia, are involved, backing opposing sides. An oft repeated saying in Africa is that when elephants fight it is only the grass that suffers. No adage could be more appropriate for the tragedy of the Yemen.

For me, the case of South Sudan is the most disappointing and in many ways the most easily avoidable of the various crises. In 2011 I wrote frequently about the emergence of the new nation of South Sudan from the yoke of domination by the North. The opportunity that the people had waited – and fought – for for more than 50 years had now arrived and they had the chance to determine their own destiny. Those of us who had worked in the region knew that there were underlying historical problems that would have to be resolved but it was only the most hardened pessimists who were predicting that the country would so soon slide into the state of ungovernable chaos that now prevails.

Since Sudan became independent from Britain in 1956, the South has only had ten years when there was no conflict somewhere within its boundaries. One, if not two, generations of people have grown up not knowing what peace, stability, good governance and development mean. Under the years of northern domination, the South was starved of resources and kept as a client state. Resentment festered and inter-ethnic disputes that stretch back many generations, over critical issues such as access to grazing and water for the livestock were allowed to continue unaddressed. It had been the hope of many that with the coming of independence these rivalries would be put to one side, for the benefit of the new nation as it took its place on the world stage. Sadly this was not the case and personal ambition of some individuals fuelled by traditional inter-ethnic suspicion and hostility has resulted in huge loss of life and millions of people now destitute.

While humanitarian assistance is essential in all of these cases, aid alone is not enough. The international community needs to find more effective ways of conflict resolution that it has at its disposal at the moment. The conflict in Yemen only involves the countries of the region, but it may be that British made weapons are being used. This should be stopped immediately. The arms being used for killing people in South Sudan are being supplied from the outside – by whom? Why are the UN and the African Union not able to exert greater controls on the regional arms trade? Who is profiting from the misery of millions?

While the various departments of the UN are well equipped to respond once a crisis has emerged, its track record of preventing crises from developing into emergencies doesn't appear to be so good. Until improved mechanisms are found to address the root causes of conflicts and prevent them from starting in

the first place, people are likely to continue to suffer we can only expect to receive more appeals for humanitarian aid. Unfortunately, it is most unlikely that these new mechanisms will emerge any time soon. *Rob Rees*

Winter-Spring 2016-17 Mostly Dry and Mild but with several Storms

It was on 'Countryfile' that I first heard that this winter was one of the driest on record, although the farmer speaking was from Gloucestershire not Shropshire. Looking at my records I found a total of 183mm at Hopton Heath for December to February, which was the second driest since my records began in 2007, after 2010-11. However, December 2016 was the driest December of my records with 35mm rainfall.

Winter 2010-2011 was very different to 2016-17 in that it was exceptionally cold while our last winter has been mild. It is unusual to have a mild and dry winter. February of this year was very mild but not particularly dry (80mm total rainfall) and we had two notable storms on 23rd and 26th (although rainfall totals were not very high).

Spring began with a fairly wet March (88mm rainfall) but up to 24th of the month April has been exceptionally dry and I have recorded only 9mm rainfall. From my records, three of the five driest months I have recorded from 2007 to 2016 have been Aprils and the next driest months have been Februarys. April 2017 may well be the driest of the whole series.

No doubt farmers will be hoping for wet weather soon but the possibility of snow this week (on 25th or 26th April) will not be what they are wanting. *Mike Tucker*

It seems that there is now more local support within the Western Cape area of South Africa, and there are local sponsors coming forward to help with projects. There is still money 'in hand', which will be distributed for regular purchases at the home, but there is additional money, which needs to be considered too.

The 'rounding off' of the project seems to be sad, but these words were sent from South Africa:

"You mustn't feel sad. You stepped in at a time when things were needed. Without the generosity of the people of Clungunford and surrounding areas many children would have suffered, as the government of the day denied there was a crisis".

It is hoped that an adequate record of the project will be made, to tell its story. This has been a significant 'Outreach Project', for St. Cuthbert's and ideas for another such project would be welcomed, and should be passed to the PCC.
