Preparation of a New Church Electoral Roll

Every 6 years a new Church Electoral Roll has to be prepared – the last one was prepared in 2013. Being on the Roll entitles a person to vote on church matters such as in the election of the Parochial Church Council much the same as being on the political Electoral Roll entitles someone to vote in political elections. The conditions for enrolment are basically that the person is 16 or over, a baptised member of the Church of England and resident in the parish or, if not resident in the parish, then a habitual attendee at church services in the parish during the last 6 months.

Even if a form was signed 6 years ago, an applicant must reapply. Forms are available on the table by the notice board inside the church alongside a posting box. A form is also being distributed with this *Gunnas Gazette* for March and can either be returned to the box in the church, to either of the Church Wardens, Mike Jones or Eddie Gledhill or to the black box outside the door at Clungunford House. **All forms must be returned by 27**th **March** to enable the Electoral Roll to be compiled in time for the Parish AGM on 24th April. In the Garden

A sunny day in Clungunford and I've just been out in the garden weedkilling because, despite it still only being February, things (weeds in particular it seems to me) are already making a fair bit of growth.

It's been a milder winter altogether so far. Last year we had the 'Beast from the East' to contend with, which meant the earliest of the bulbs in the garden were held back from coming into flower when they should have been, with the result we had a lot of bulbs all flowering at once when the weather eventually got warmer. Making quite a good display though.

This year we've had crocuses and snowdrops for a few weeks now and as their display is coming to an end anemones and daffodils are talking their place in proper sequence.

Last year there were some experts who said we got the particularly good fruit crops as a result of the 'Beast from the East' holding flowering back until the spell of 'hot for the time of year' weather which followed. We haven't had either of them yet, so we'll see if what the experts said was so.

In the garden, look out for one of the mulberry trees – *Morus Alba Pendula*' - a deciduous spreading tree, with rounded deeply lobed glossy deep green leaves that turn yellow in autumn. Inconspicuous flowers appear in spring, leading to edible pink red or purple fruits in summer. The size of the crop perhaps depending on

whether or not the 'Beast from the East' puts in a late appearance after I've written this. Brian Taylor

Beginning on March 4th, the bar is to undergo a refit. It would be a shame to carry out the refurbishment of the hall, (the kitchen having been recently reworked) and not pay attention to the bar and lounge. Work will be confined to the bar area, initially, but we will aim to keep a service going during the work. It won't be ideal but, obviously some sacrifices will have to be endured whilst the work takes place.

There is no external funding available to support this work but a team of volunteers are raring to go so that the work may happen and should be completed as the main hall works come to a conclusion.

Spring in February ...a record?

As I look out into the garden on a mild, sunny spring-like morning, it is difficult to believe that it is not yet the end of February. The winter as a whole has been very mild, with only one or two days with a trace of snow, at the end of January. Up to today (23rd) the mean maximum February temperature has been 9.8°C, even warmer than the previous warmest in 2017. The mean minimum has been slightly lower than in 2017, making the overall mean slightly less in 2019 than in 2017. For the whole winter, December to February, 2018-9 has been slightly warmer than 2016-17 and has probably broken more records.

In terms of rainfall, after the drought during the summer, the period September to December 2018 was quite wet with a total rainfall of 392mm. However, January was very dry with only 37mm and February has been dry, apart from the 5-10th, which were wet. The total for February, so far, is 50mm at Hopton Heath.

The present warm weather has resulted from a stationary high pressure system over Europe, situated so as to bring warm winds from the south, from Spain or even north Africa. Frequently, strong high pressure systems bring cold easterly winds, as in last year's 'Beast from the East'. Of course that cold weather continued into March, so we cannot assume that there will be no cold weather before the end of March.

Is this all due to global warming? Individual warm spells have always occurred but it is the frequency that we are getting them that is significant. Also extreme temperatures are more common in other parts of the world, such as the extreme heat wave that Australia recently experienced. The school-children's protest makes a serious point. More needs to be done to reduce greenhouse gases and it's the younger generation that is most likely to suffer the consequences of too little action. *Mike Tucker*

From the Vicarage

Happy Spring Everyone!

We've had some amazing foggy mornings recently, coming at a time when I've been reflecting on the dilemma of how we see clearly. At a recent lively family Baptism, we heard the lovely piece about love from St Paul's first letter to the Corinthians. They were always falling out with one another and really needed the

advice!. Tucked away at the end is this picture: "For now we see as in an old mirror, dimly; but then we shall see clearly, face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I am fully known." (1 Corinthians 13v12)

To understand what Paul means, we have to imagine looking through very old glass where light is distorted, or ancient mirrors which were made of beaten metal so you would never be able to see a really clear image of yourself in them.

Looking out of my window I was reminded of Paul's message and the dilemma of how we come to see things clearly. The thick fog began to lift slowly, gradually revealing sparse images, which then filled out until, later, in full sunshine everything was clear.



First there was just a hazy skeleton of a single tree. Only later could I see that it didn't stand alone and the grey tones began to take on colour. A great illustration of how our vision can expand. We may not see things as they really are, what we see ebbs and flows and hopefully, grows, as our eyes are opened (if we allow it) throughout our lives.

As a child there was an ancient tree in the fields behind our house. It terrified me. Its gnarled old limbs seemed to harbour wizened faces and evil beings that haunted my dreams. Only years later when my sight problems were diagnosed and I was given specs was I able see the beauty and age in its old whorls and hoary boles and recognise it as a place of hospitality for birds and squirrels. Only then was I able to befriend that magnificent old tree.

This is why I enjoy working with the rhythm of the Church; it echoes the natural ebb and flow of light and growth in the world around us. Lent is about to begin, which gives us time to reflect and time to work our way through some of the mists and fog in our lives, allowing our sight to become clearer as the time of new births, Easter Resurrection and flourishing arrives.

Through Lent there will be a couple of groups being run in the Benefice which could help us in that journey. In Clungunford one of the excellent York courses is being run by Christine and Robert (ask them for details). And I will be running another series of "Times of Reflection" on Wednesday evenings in people's homes around the Benefice. These evenings are a great opportunity to share and listen to one another and eat cake! The first is on Wednesday 13th March at Melin y Grogue, over at Llanfair Waterdine hosted by Graham and Richard. Please let them know if you would like to join us. Everyone welcome. Let us know if you'd like to join us. Full details of both are available in the Deanery magazine or from one of your Wardens.

We do hope that you will join us.


Sunday 28th April 10.30am at St Cuthbert's, Holy Communion Service followed by The Middle Marches Benefice APCM

Nursing Notes

While I was trawling through long forgotten "stuff," I came across my old Queen Elizabeth School of Nursing brochure. I thought I would share some of it with you.

This particular hospital was opened by the Queen in 1939 and was considered one of the most modern hospitals in the country. The brochure throughout only ever spoke of girls entering the profession, and candidates were only accepted up to the age of 33 years and training took 4 years. The first eleven weeks were spent in the Preliminary Training School where we had daily lectures & practical experience. "Their first patient may well be Miss Prudence Chase – a lifeless but lifelike model of resigned and stoical expression appropriate to one who endures, in the cause of instruction, innumerable bed baths from inexperienced hands!"

At the end of the preliminary training we had to pass exams and have a satisfactory health report: "the health of their nurses is of first importance to any hospital." We then were received into the Queen Elizabeth School as a student nurse in training for the State Registration examinations. At this point we were assigned to either the Queen Elizabeth or General Hospital (opened in 1897). Under the NHS Act of 1946 seven hospitals were amalgamated to form the United Birmingham Hospitals. Five of these hospitals participate in the training of the students of the Q.E. School of Nursing, the brochure goes on to say;

"The regulations affecting a nurse's private life have been reduced to a minimum during recent years. The rules accord so much with modern views that nurses may have visitors, male and female, in the recreation rooms and guest rooms of the Nurses' Homes and are encouraged to develop wide recreational interests and a normal social life. Opportunities exist for outdoor activities in the form of tennis and hockey and an interesting monthly programme is arranged in the Nurses' Home which includes Symphony Concerts, Art Classes, Films, Amateur Dramatics and Dances."

In reality male visitors were not encouraged, and I saw very little interesting monthly programmes! However, I did take advantage of the ability to play tennis, also playing hockey which was generally against an all-male team of doctors: this was vicious & resulted in many interesting bruises!

At the end of the first year we took the Preliminary State Examination, and, after passing this, we continued our work on the wards, with periodic study leave when we attended more lectures in preparation for the final examinations of the General Nursing Council. During our training we worked for 3 months at the Children's Hospital (opened in Steelhouse Lane in 1862 and moved to Ladywood Road in 1917); some also worked at the Women's Hospital (opened in 1871) for gynaecological experience, and the Nerve Hospital (opened in1920) for experience in psychiatric and neurological disorders.

Three years into our training we took the final examination, and State Registration. In our fourth year the nurse must now "learn to accept her responsibilities

as a trained member of the Nursing profession and, in a familiar atmosphere, is taught to supervise the work of others and the principles of Administration and Organisation. The certificate and badge of the Queen Elizabeth School of Nursing is awarded to all nurses who have completed their full training"

"The first need in a girl who wants to be a nurse is, that she must *want* to be a nurse. Nursing is not just a job, and a sense of vocation exists in all those who have made a success of it"

Ludlow Advertiser 21 July 1906

Before the Purslow Magistrates:

DUAL OFFENCE. Charles Farmer, wheelwright. Hopton's Heath, appeared in answer to two summonses., viz riding bicycle unlighted at 10.45 pm. at Hopton's Heath; and being drunk and disorderly at Clungunford at 11.00 pm on July 4. P.C. Wenlock deposed that whilst riding his bicycle in the district named he discovered defendant lying in a ditch with a bicycle bearing no lamp near him. At Clungunford, whilst in company with P.C. Diggory 20 minutes later, defendant approached them in drunken condition, and used bad language to the officers, threatening to give them "a good hiding". Defendant at first desired the hearing to be postponed to enable him call two lady witnesses. He afterwards withdrew the application. P.C. Diggory stated that he met P.C. Wenlock at Hopton's Heath. Whilst talking near the station Defendant came up and remarked "What do you mean, Wenlock, by saying I am riding bicycle without a light?" P.C. Wenlock requested Defendant to go away, but he remained there using language "not fit to repeat" before the officers. Defendant afterwards went to Mr. Smith, called him up, and a neighbour named Smith, and aroused him, and turned back on the road again. He followed the officers, continuing his bad language.— Defendant: Did I stagger about the roadway? —You did.—How then could I be riding bicycle without a light?—Defendant said had attended a club fete that day. He accompanied two young ladies to the Twitching. He denied that he had ridden the machine the date named.—The Bench considered both charges proved, and fined defendant 10 shillings inclusive.
